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A WORD FROM THE COACHES





April 2024. As we are writing this editorial, 100 days remain before the start of the Olympic then Paralympic Games of Paris 2024, a 4-week sporting competition that will bring together athletes from around the world... which is also a 4-week Olympic Truce supposed to remind us all how sport promotes peace, dialogue and reconciliation.

These themes have been at the heart of PLAY's programmes for 25 years now, and they are a dire necessity after 2023 saw armed conflicts aggravate, new war zones emerge and of our ability to live with one another deteriorate, with an increase in day-to-day violence and discrimination.

For yes, sport can be a powerful lever to preserve and promote peace and reconciliation between peoples. A living proof is our work in Kosovo for the past 25 years, in Burundi for 15 years, in Senegal, especially Casamance, for almost 5 years, and in Rwanda since 2023.

Yes, **sport is an efficient means of integration for the millions displaced** by conflict, by climate change or because of who they are. In 2023 PLAY deployed its methodology across Europe with its partners, extended its «Terrains d'Avenir» programme to stakeholders in the French sports ecosystem, and continued its advocacy on this topic, including alongside the IOC as a signatory of the Pledge: Sport for Inclusion and Protection at the World Refugee Forum organised in December 2023 by the UNHCR.

Yes, sport must enable a stronger dialogue between all people, foster social harmony (the French «Vivre Ensemble"), and help all minorities and anyone, regardless of gender or disability, to feel they belong in society. Every day, we do our best to prove it - thanks to the support of Paris 2024 - by promoting

the Paralympic values (determination, equality, inspiration and courage) in all the countries where we work, as well as through our action research aimed at developing social skills among children with Autism Syndrome Disorder. Another example is our École Active programme, which aims to give girls and boys the same opportunities to engage in sports.

Yes, **sport can be a fantastic learning accelerator**, as shown by our "Teaching through movement" method, a way to ally body and mind based on our belief that the best way for children to memorise and learn is by moving their body (and having fun!).

This work takes time, and its social impact still needs to be further established and documented; we're working hard on it. It's the only way to go beyond the clichés about the alleged inherent values of sport that are so much in the air in this Olympic year. And to demonstrate that sport is a key element of social change, although underused. In 2023, we strived to be ambitious PLAYers, promoting greater physical activity as a way to understand, to support our children's education and to bring our youth back in social harmony.

In 2024, we will be uncompromising PLAYers, to ensure that in this historical year, sport is finally recognised for its true worth as a powerful lever for education, inclusion and development - in other words for the transformation of society.

ACTIVE AND INCLUSIVE EDUCATION: SCALING UP THE EJO PROJECT ("TOMORROW" IN KIRUNDI)

Africa and the Balkans

In April 2023, we launched the second phase of our Ejo project, which ran across 4 countries for a little over 3 years (2019-2023), mainly thanks to the support of the AFD (Agence Française de Développement).

In Burundi, Senegal, Liberia as well as in Côte d'Ivoire for 2025, Ejo is expanding and getting stronger with the continuing aim of helping to improve the way children are cared for in schools and out-of-school structures. To grant the most vulnerable access to quality education, we are training ever more teachers and sports instructors in the use of sports games as an innovative, high-impact methodology addressing



a wide range of educational and social issues in the target regions. The priority themes that will be developed over the next 3 years are: **strengthening basic skills (reading, writing & arithmetic), combating gender inequality and gender-based violence, and promoting social harmony**. To ensure these activities take root over the long term, the project aims to build the capacity of local informal education organisations, and to raise awareness among communities so they can embrace these issues and methodologies and, in collaboration with PLAY, bring them forward to national institutions. During the first months, 3 sports kits aimed at combating gender-based violence were co-created for lower secondary school pupils, as well as 3 sports kits aimed at strengthening maths skills for primary school pupils. Nearly 300 teachers and instructors have already been trained and almost 7,000 children have already benefited from sports games sessions.



In Kosovo, Montenegro and Northern Macedonia, Ejo has become Sport 4 Resilience. Its purpose is to help strengthen the resilience and psychosocial skills of children and young people by training 200 teachers and 75 members of civil society organisations and deploying the programme to nearly 21,000 children and 600 young adults by 2026. This project is carried out in partnership with 2 local organisations: TAKT («Together Advancing Common Trust

organisations: TAKT («Together Advancing Common Trust «) in Northern Macedonia, and REGSPO («Regional Sport Initiative - Playing Together») in Montenegro, both trained in our methods and in charge of rolling out the programme in their own countries.

Inclusive Sports Academies Programme in Africa

Support sports academies to strengthen their capacities and develop their expertise in gender equality and education

In 2023, PLAY International's Academies Programme expanded, welcoming 12 new academies; reaching a total of **17 supported structures in 11 different African countries**. This broadened the range of sports, which now includes skateboarding, circus arts, tennis and athletics. 2023 also saw the organisation of the 1st bootcamp at the Diambars Institute in Saly (Senegal) with the 4 academies of the pilot phase, launching the establishment of a network of players in the field of sport and development in Africa.

At the same time, a substantial technical and financial partnership with FIFA has enriched the programme, putting the focus on child protection and enabling 3 National Football Federations to join. This collaboration shows PLAY International's and FIFA's shared commitment to providing a safe and inclusive environment for young athletes. These advances reflect the continued growth and positive impact of the Academies Programme in the field of sport and youth development, in line with PLAY International's core values.

PLAY's status as a major player in sport development is recognized internationally. Thomas Bach, President of the International Olympic Committee, mentioned PLAY during his speech at the **Global Refugee Summit (13-15/12)** in Lausanne, as a committed player and signatory of the Sport Pledge.

Following this impetus, over 100 players, including PLAY, signed a manifesto published on 10/27, to express their shared commitment to inclusion through sport.

New beginnings

Moving to Saint-Ouen-sur-Seine

Imagine and create offices reflecting PLAY's personality; playful, sporty, practical and fun to work in: such was the challenge met brilliantly by the design team of our new premises in Saint-Ouensur-Seine, aimed at gathering in a single location all our French teams.

Our partners in this adventure were on the one hand Covivio, property specialist and owner of the CB21 Tower (the location of the Vertigo race), who volunteered their skills to help PLAY relocate its headquarters, and on the other the architects of Factory, our new neighbours, who understood and responded to our needs... creatively!

The main challenge was to create, within a tight budget, a space that embodied PLAY's DNA and values, while offering the best possible work and communication environment:

- a 'sporting' take on our identity for the floor and walls,
- spaces adapted to all needs and audiences (concentration, training, collaborative work)
- a cosy kitchen, which would serve as a living space inducive to sharing between staff.

Lastly, most of the previous furniture was upcycled or reused, and Factory donated furniture for the meeting areas.

The result is a friendly, light-filled space that is well-suited, optimised, welcoming and, above all, a reflection of PLAY's identity.

PLAY'S STRATEGY

PLAY International is a pioneering NGO in the field of education through sport.

It was founded in 1999, under the name Sport sans Frontières (Sport Without Borders), on a strong belief that sport is a powerful lever for education, development, and social integration for the youth of the world. Our ambition is to bring about a lasting change in children's behaviour, so they become enlightened citizens for the future, and to unleash the extraordinary potential of sport.



To achieve this, we work daily with our institutional partners and in the field, to:

- 1. **Help include** the most vulnerable.
- 2. **Promote and facilitate access to sport** as a source of physical and mental well-being.
- 3. Raise awareness and give young people the resources to respond to current societal issues as well as promote social harmony.
- 4. **Prove and convince** that sport is a powerful lever for development.

TEACHING METHODS

Building on our strengths to keep innovating

For 25 years, PLAY International has been using different forms of sports games around the world to educate, raise awareness, protect and help tomorrow's citizens to grow.

The games we create locally use different educational levers to put children at the heart of their learning:

- By reasserting **the importance of having fun on the pitch**, offering children a joyful moment of release and a calming, relaxed cognitive experience. The pleasure of playing, no longer just an end, becomes a way to improve learning and to perceive play as a possible source of education.
- By continuing to **use symbolism** to rename objects and places and redefine roles, we encourage children to picture themselves in situations mirroring facets of social life and the challenges brought to the playground, opening the space to talk about anything and everything.
- By creating a sacred time for debate and collective discussion at the end of each session, that allows children to express their feelings, understand the issues and risks of the situations they have been confronted with, make the connection with their daily lives and become agents of change who will refuse or fight certain situations.
- By training more and more teachers, youth workers and sports coaches in **Teaching through Movement**, which beyond a mere physical activity, is the embodiment of our conviction that the mind learns and memorises better when the body moves.



Those foundational principles have proved their worth over the past 25 years, and in 2023, PLAY International has continued to innovate and develop its «playdagogy» approaches to be as close as possible to children's needs while integrating the specificities of local contexts, and to remain true to its DNA:

- This year once again, PLAY International created sessions mixing different sports: football in Burundi, rugby in France, acrobatic gymnastics in Senegal, athletics in the Comoros, etc. This development has shown that our teaching approaches can use different types of physical activity to support our educational programmes, while demonstrating to our partners in the sporting ecosystem (clubs, federations, PE teachers) that sport can help bring about change and raise awareness.
- In Senegal and Liberia, **new forms of end-of-session debates** were tested with teenagers. The participants were
 encouraged to form groups and develop collective and shared
 points of view, which were then presented and discussed
 by designated spokespersons. With this approach, PLAY
 International helped youths to become conscious citizens
 respecting collective frameworks for dialogue, while tackling
 issues such as health, discrimination and gender equality. In



Kosovo, this process allowed several partners to be introduced to the fight against gender discrimination.

All our missions featured innovations designed to make sport an effective tool for social change:

In the Comoros, PLAY International helped rewrite the school PE syllabus, creating an innovative tool combining physical progression with inclusive, civic-minded training.

In France, a new educational pathway was designed, allowing children to create their own activity: through a collaborative and progressive card game, children can imagine a physical activity they will then set up out of a desire to see their project brought to life. Creating their own activities enables children to enjoy exercise more.



In Burundi and Senegal, contents were designed to help children read, write and do arithmetic better, through simple sessions based on the texts and teaching goals of the local curricula. In both countries, professionals and PLAYers worked together to support teachers with learning tools, and feedback already shows that children have progressed significantly on the target subjects.

Lastly, all these programmes and deployments involved support and training local education professionals. By analysing their practices in the field, PLAY International enabled hundreds of professionals to improve the way they work, and in turn to better train others, implement practices and pass on their new knowledge.

2023 was an exciting year for PLAY International's teams in Burundi.

The inclusive education and learning programmes benefited many. The Burundi mission's advocacy efforts to make sport accessible to all, and thus contribute to strengthening social cohesion, were consistently pursued with local organisations, institutions and donors.

2023 further established the Ejo project, with the second phase drawing on a large group of dynamic and empowered educators to deliver sports and educational sessions in the field.

Last year PLAY worked hand in hand with the Ministry of Education and Scientific Research (MENRS) as part of the Twige Neza («Let's learn well» in Kirundi) project to use games to teach basic skills, particularly mathematics, and to raise awareness among Burundi's teenage students about the combat against gender-based violence (GBV).

PLAY also completed the Twiyunge («Let's unite» in Kirundi) project in communities which now successfully host large numbers of returnees. The power of play and playful exchanges facilitated social cohesion and the integration of young people into schools.

Drawing on a core team of 16 trainers who work in extra-curricular activities and along with teachers in partner schools, PLAY promotes a continuity of education and inclusion-themed activities through sport and play.

Learning through play enabled 549 children aged 8 to 9 to test their mathematical knowledge while being physically active since the start of the 2023 school year.

The teaching content was devised and designed under the supervision of the Burundi Ministry of Education and follows the targets set by the national curriculum. Initial and ongoing training enables us to work closely with teachers, headmasters and educators to provide logistical and pedagogical support. Once a week, 8 public schools commit to set up these mathematical games, much to the delight of the children and teachers. Learning through play is also a way of tackling GBV and 816 teenagers are being taught about this issue. In addition to deploying these contents in schools, PLAY provides regular support for young people in Bujumbura through a network of educators trained and supported by PLAY. This deployment is being done in close collaboration with local organisations, who are then empowered to work independently with their communities.



Considered a priority by the Burundian government, the fight against school dropout and early pregnancies linked to gender-based violence has been deployed nationally and institutionalised through the training of Aunties and Fathers. The Aunties and Fathers are teachers chosen by the pupils whose responsibility is to listen, identify and report instances of vulnerability/violence experienced by the children.

Working closely with members of the Ministry of Education and Scientific Research, educational content was developed and offered to Aunties and Fathers, as well as to PLAY's youth workers.

These games enabled 472 Aunties and Fathers, 4 provincial education officials from 4 of the country's provinces and youth workers to lift some taboos and discuss everyday issues with the youths.

Several vulnerability situations were identified thanks to these games and passed on to the local authorities and the 23 members of the family development centres, who were also trained as part of the programme.

The educators and teachers were given sports equipment and a manual listing the teaching content and theoretical approaches to active listening, the combat against GBV, etc., to ensure the programme would continue its course in the future.











«Since the start of the programme with PLAY, the dropout rate in my school has decresased: before, we had huge dropout figures but now the rate has fallen and this year, 21 pupils returned to school and were reintegrated into a class.»

The PEPS, Projet d'appui à l'Éducation Physique et Sportive (Physical Education Support Project), which purpose is to promote long-term access for all Comorian children to inclusive physical and sports activities, reached important milestones in 2023.


The year was notable for:

- the PEPS launch ceremony at the Malouzini Stadium in Moroni, attended by representatives of the French Embassy, the Ministry of Education, Scientific Research, Training and Professional Integration, the Ministry of Youth, Work, Training and Professional Integration, Sport, the Arts and Culture, many sports and education stakeholders, and 80 primary and secondary school pupils who came to enjoy sporting and educational activities.
- an in-depth analysis of Physical Education (PE) in primary schools: around a hundred interviews were conducted with school, sports and community stakeholders on the 3 islands.
- the updating of the reference framework for teaching sport in schools.
- the co-creation of primary school PE modules in collaboration with the French Ministry of Education (MEN) and the Institut de Formation des Enseignants et de la Recherche en Education (IFERE), which set the motor goals and skills to be acquired each school year.
- the creation and ordering of educational sports kits.

At the same time, an initial training session for trainers was held on the island of Grande Comore. 45 participants attended, laying the foundations for the future PE training for Comorian teachers from 2024 onwards. Meanwhile, based on a bibliographical, technical and empirical study, the PLAY International team set about producing the curriculum and teacher's manual, which is now officially regarded as the reference document for primary schools in educational sport.

PEPS : Projet d'appui à l'Éducation Physique et Sportive (Physical Education Support Project)

PEPS Comoros, which will run for three years, is part of the French government's France-Comoros Development Plan (PDFC) and aims at improving learning conditions in primary and secondary schools by promoting physical education throughout the country. The project will use sport as a teaching tool to favour physical and mental health, improve school performance, prevent school drop-out, foster social inclusion and promote gender equality; the coming sports programmes will also include psychosocial skills development. This project is based on a strong partnership strategy with sustained engagement of government, educational, and sports stakeholders in the Comoros, who will be consistently supported, equipped, and empowered throughout the project.















«PLAY International is very important in the Comoros. Comoros is a country like any other. At the beginning we didn't have any sporting equipment, we didn't know what to do, but since PLAY joined our team, we've designed the curriculum together. We now have an idea of what we should be doing in sport.

Sport is very important for us girls because it is key to our health. I feel much healthier now that I practice sports.

I'm extremely proud and delighted that now we can say that sports can be practised without any problems in the Comoros.»

2023 featured the development of relationships with local field stakeholders and collaborative innovations to meet the new challenges faced by professionals and our partners.

As part of our **École Active** («Active School») initiative, 90 teachers from 11 schools were trained to help 2,400 children and carry out educational projects on the key issues of gender equality and school atmosphere. PLAY also supported the training and deployment of mediators in secondary schools in Seine-et-Marne, who worked with more than 1,000 pupils.

To develop **social harmony** and strengthen our actions aligned with urban policy, we trained 100 educators to reach 3,000 children. Our chosen partners include the Azimut et Advance prevention clubs in Mons-en-Baroeul and Villeneuve-d'Ascq, which use our content to re-engage children in priority urban neighbourhoods. Now young people and their educators are deploying Playdagogy in schools!

Inclusion is also at the heart of our projects. Two projects in Epinay-sur-Seine and Sarcelles (mostly within the ULIS schemes) were born thanks to our content dedicated to **the inclusion of children with disabilities**. What is more, the ongoing Terrains d'Avenir ("Fields of the Future «) programme, by helping 2,150 displaced persons, has shown how sport can be lever for reengagement and inclusion.

Lastly, our long-standing partnership with Paris 2024 continues to grow in the run-up to the Olympic and Paralympic Games, driving us to innovate even further:

- by making children the co-designers of the future educational games we will deploy,
- by assisting sports clubs in setting up educational initiatives in schools and priority neighbourhoods

In line with its École Active programme and its commitment to supporting schoolteachers, PLAY launched a pilot project in partnership with the Alice Milliat Foundation to promote gender diversity in playgrounds.

How is PLAY doing this? By developing a new teaching method that enrols children and their teachers in the design of the solution, and by helping them to create a game involving everyone on the playground! This innovative project was carried out in 3 pilot schools in 2023 and includes 3 phases:

- an assessment of how playground space is used
- workshops to raise awareness of gender stereotypes and the role of women in sporting activities;
- and finally, the workshops where the children create the game.

The goal is to draw up an educational kit that can later be distributed widely so teachers can run this process on their own.







PLAY and Point Sud, a nonprofit working in Marseille's priority neighbourhoods, were contacted by the Rugby Club de Marseille (RCM), which wanted to develop its educational initiatives, especially around the themes of **gender equality** and the inclusion of girls.

The purpose of the project, which won the Impact 2024 award, is to design and roll out an awareness programme around these issues by adapting PLAY's existing material to the local context and to a rugby game set-up. Thanks to the cooperation and synergy between the three stakeholders, more than 260 children were reached in 4 months through activities organised in front of apartment buildings and in schools of priority neighbourhoods. This is exactly the kind of project that enables PLAY to demonstrate both its ability to support stakeholders of the sporting ecosystem in deploying locally impactful solutions, and the relevance of its deeply cooperative approach, where players from very different backgrounds manage to work together. Given the positive initial results, this project will continue in 2024 with two new partners and new schools and will develop a new theme: the inclusion of children with disabilities.



«As a teacher involved in the project between SAJE 20 and PLAY International, I'm very pleased to see the positive impact our collaboration has had on the youths I supervise. The workshops enabled the creative management of emotions, through sports and educational games. The youths were invited to explore their emotions, create their own educational sports games and play them with 200 young people from the 20th arrondissement, thereby boosting their self-esteem. This project has fostered in them a better understanding of self and others, and their active participation demonstrates a potential for lasting change.»

In 2023, PLAY continued to deploy its programmes in the formal and non-formal sectors. It successfully completed the last session of teacher training of Ejo project, which goal was thus achieved.

Two new projects were launched simultaneously. First, a one-year project (August 2022 - October 2023) called Ferizaj to Gravelines - Inclusion and Coexistence through Sport involves training educators in our «All players, all friends» contents, aimed at including disabled children in sports sessions. At the same time, PLAY recruited six young people aged between 18 and 25 from the town of Ferizaj, offering them a French language course thanks to the French Embassy and the Pristina Alliance Française, and the opportunity to work with their counterparts in Gravelines during Olympic Day in June.

Second, PLAY launched the **Sport4Resilience** project, which took over from Ejo, emphasising how sport participates in the promotion of resilience. In partnership with two local organisations, TAKT and REGSPO, the programme will be deployed in Kosovo, as well as in Northern Macedonia and Montenegro, thanks to the French Development Agency and the European Union. Throughout the year, we actively participated in various celebrations with these partners, including events to mark the International Day of Sport for Development and Peace, Olympic Day, several job fairs and our certification ceremonies.

This project is the result of a collaboration between the local authorities of Gravelines in France and of Ferizaj in Kosovo. This decentralised cooperation, carried out with PLAY's support, aims to effectively promote sport as a means of integration and educational tool to raise awareness among children, teachers and communities on the importance of letting disabled children participate in school and out-of-school activities with other children. 6 young adults from Ferizaj were trained by PLAY to run sports and educational sessions for over 250 children in their community. After taking French lessons, they travelled to Gravelines to run sports games sessions in a reception and education centre for children with disabilities, which enabled young people from both countries to exchange best practice.

In Gravelines, PLAY also took part in the town's "Copains du Monde Village" (World Mates Village), holding educational sessions for nearly 100 children on the theme of combating discrimination and raising awareness on the importance of international cooperation and friendship.



In 2023, the PLAY team completed the Ejo project, which deployment started in 2019. In this final stretch, the teams primarily trained the last batch of teachers in the content of the programme, thus ensuring a legacy of educational empowerment. Subsequently, PLAY's dedicated trainers visited the remaining batches of teachers, guiding them thoroughly and carefully through the implementation activities. As a result, three batches of teachers were certified in 2023.

At the same time, two other batches, who had undergone training as part of the «All players, all friends» initiative, received their certification. Building on the recommendations and needs identified in the project, PLAY has gotten involved in another large-scale project that will run in Kosovo from 2023 to 2026: Sport 4 Resilience, thereby demonstrating its commitment to transformative initiatives that have a positive impact on communities.

« As a PLAY International volunteer, I was lucky enough to take part in two and teaching methods, but also gained an insight into children's rights and promoting inclusion within communities. Subsequently, my participation in me with invaluable opportunities for cultural interaction. From French immersion classes to the implementation of socio-sporting activities in Kosovo and France, this programme enabled me to deepen my understanding of intercultural dynamics while highlighting the power of sport to bridge divides. These projects not only allowed me to contribute to important causes





In 2023, Mercy Corps and PLAY completed the first 3-year phase of the Ejo project and officially launched phase 2 in April. Following a positive impact assessment, the teams immediately began co-creating the first contents that will be rolled out in the formal and informal education sector over the next 3 years. In just a few months, an assessment of the gender equality and social inclusion context (GESI) in Liberia was carried out, resulting in the co-creation of a kit aimed at **combating gender-based violence** for secondary school pupils, with the collaboration of 15 education professionals and gender experts.

50 secondary school teachers were trained in these games and subsequently used them with around a hundred children.

For primary schools, a teaching kit aimed at **reinforcing maths skills** was co-created. The sessions were tested, 45 schools were identified in the Grand Bassa and Rivercess counties and the first training sessions will take place in early 2024.

Lastly, Mercy Corps also continued to build the capacity of four Liberian civil society organisations (CSOs), which will soon be key players in the deployment of out-of-school activities.

Yiwah started school at 7, making her one of the oldest children in the nursery. Other children, and even the teachers and carers, used to teas her about her age.

«Since they were making fun of me, I only focused on my lessons. Because I was doing well at school, I became class president several times. The game «Skool's Cool» is therefore one of my favourites because it reminds us that a resolute spirit can overcome any challenge. Today, thanks to my self-esteem, I can express myself freely in this conversation. Since I started taking part in the post-session debates, I've been feeling that my opinions matter. This is all thanks to the games of the Ejo programme. For instance, in the 'Road to Success' game, you can be challenged to get your skills, but you must work hard so that they don't label you, because you'll be eliminated from the game if you're labelled. It's the same in real life, success doesn't come so easily.»

RWANDA

In 2023, PLAY opened a new mission in Rwanda. After its arrival in May, PLAY helped **implement the REKA («stop» in Kinyarwanda)** project run by Humanity & Inclusion Rwanda to **combat violence against children based on age, gender or disability.**

PLAY's role in this project was central: first it adapted games to raise awareness on this sensitive issue among Rwandan children and youth, then it trained future trainers and lastly, it trained teachers to coordinate prevention and child protection school clubs. Last year, PLAY trained 3 teachers in each of seven partner schools, for a total of 21, in games and playful educational sessions to prevent violence against children. These sessions were deployed with the help of local partners: Humanity & Inclusion Rwanda and Caritas Rwanda. In November the children were also involved in 16 days of activism against gender-based violence.

Thanks to PLAY's tools, the girls and boys involved in the clubs learn about their rights, discover the different types of violence, get to know the available services and contribute to awareness-raising and prevention efforts against violence in their community, school or home.

PLAY's ambition is now to strengthen its partnership with HI, which also operates in Senegal, and from 2024 onwards to develop new programmes in Rwanda so it becomes, like in other part of the world, a major player in education through sport.

PLAY is still in the process of being registered as a nongovernmental organisation in Rwanda.

Humanity & Inclusion (formerly Handicap International)

In Rwanda, HI implements inclusive education projects to provide schooling for all children and facilitates access to care for vulnerable people and people with disabilities.

In the Rwandan refugee camps, HI provides vulnerable people, particularly those with mental health issues and rehabilitation needs, with access to care and protection. By improving access to technical assistance, such as wheelchairs or walking sticks, as well as psychosocial support, the organisation helps to eliminate existing inequalities and barriers and to make disadvantaged people's daily lives easier.

HI also works with children, particularly those with disabilities, on several inclusive education projects. It collaborates with national authorities to guarantee access to education for all, by training teachers and making buildings accessible to disabled children. In addition, it creates textbooks and provides teaching materials adapted to different needs, such as Braille textbooks. HI also organises awareness-raising sessions for local stakeholders and communities, and promotes the sharing of best practice, especially in working groups.

To combat sexual and gender-based violence, HI carries out awareness and advocacy actions in communities. It assists survivors of sexual and gender-based violence, for example through art therapy sessions, and trains the medical, psychosocial and legal professionals around them so they can provide adequate support. It also organises awareness campaigns, especially in schools, and strives to break down the barriers that prevent women and children victims of violence from accessing appropriate services. HI also works with men, particularly community leaders, to raise awareness and prevent violence.



«At the training of trainers course, we learn, and we play. Through playful activities, we learn how to prevent violence, and above all, we learn how children can actively protect themselves. And we position ourselves at the child's level, which is very important to teach. At school, I set up the Circle of Protection game. This game awakens children's minds and helps them to develop their ability to feel concerned and empathetic towards victims of violence».


In 2023, PLAY International Senegal strengthened its operational capacity by recruiting 7 new team members.

The **Ejo** project continued to promote sport among children aged 6 to 15 in the regions of Ziguinchor, Dakar, Louga and Saint-Louis. PLAY stepped up its efforts with the co-creation of locally adapted teaching content and the organisation of trainings for teachers and youth workers. From November, Ejo's increased its impact in the protection of children's rights with the help of the European Union.

At the same time, the **Academies Programme** made substantial progress, setting itself the target of developing 30 inclusive sports academies across Africa. In collaboration with Diambars and FIFA, PLAY continued with the assessment, call for projects and bootcamp phases, with a particular focus on gender and education. The academies involved in this project are based in 11 different African countries.

The **Grâce au sport, je m'épanouis** (Sports to bloom) project continued to promote sport as an educational and inclusive tool in Senegalese public secondary schools. This went beyond mere sports practice, using sport as a vector for developing skills and raising awareness of major societal issues, especially school violence.

Lastly, the project Jeunes engagés pour la cohésion sociale en Casamance (Youth for social cohesion in Casamance) has been instrumental in strengthening social cohesion in long-deserted villages of Casamance by using cross-community dialogue through sports initiatives and community events.

This project uses sport as a medium to develop skills and raise awareness of societal issues, with a teaching programme based on Playdagogy, a unique PLAY approach. It is being rolled out in 9 public secondary schools in the Kaolack, Thiès and Dakar regions, with goal of creating an inclusive educational environment. Of the 25 teachers identified during the assessment phase, 21 have been successfully trained. The project includes 3 special co-created kits: Prevention of Violence Promotion of Cooperation (PVPC), Community Life, and Health and Wellbeing. These kits have been developed in collaboration with

In 2023, two of these kits were successfully passed on to teachers and members of the Ministry. On average, each trained PE teacher runs at least one session a month with PLAY's support.

the Ministry of Education, inspectors (the Inspection d'Académie and the Inspection générale de l'Éducation

régional de Formation des Personnels de l'Éducation

et de la Formation) and trainers from the Centre

(CRFPE).

This project promotes sport as an educational pillar, fostering a rewarding physical education for Senegal's youth, in line with the government's call for a revival of sport in schools.



PLAY and Jógjëf (PULSE's office in Senegal), two SOS Group entities operating in Casamance, wanted to work together. Their goal was to include sports games in support programmes intended for young people and women carrying out projects with a social and environmental impact.

The two teams collaborated to strengthen Jógjëf's teaching methods and offer both new processes adapted to their targets. During a series of workshops, a kit of 6 sessions was co-created: 2 sessions to be used during the awareness-raising phase in Casamance's local communities, and 4 others to be used during the following conception phase, during which young people receive support. These games were tested with participants aged between 16 and 21. The future goal is to improve the awareness games for better impact. As sports games seem to be an effective way to attract young people, Jógjëf wants to broaden its action by supporting more and more youths from local communities.















«I confess that we had many questions and doubts within the department when the project started, because we didn't know what it actually involved. However, after taking a first training course, I can now say that all my uncertainties have been cleared up. I will fully support the PLAY project within the Department, because the programme «Grâce au sport je m'épanouis!» is very timely. Physical education today needs a new momentum, and this project brings a new teaching approach that fits perfectly the practice of sport in schools. This project must be rolled out throughout Senegal.»

Playlab, PLAY International's Social Innovation hub created in 2017, is a place for research, sharing, co-creation, learning and incubation that constantly aims to rethink PLAY's operating model, to provide practical, innovative solutions to the challenges surrounding education, social harmony and health. It backs our missions in the field, ensuring that PLAY is always one step ahead.

Major progress was made in the two **Action Research** programmes carried out in partnership with the University of Rennes 2: the first one, aimed at evaluating and assessing the socio-educational impact of the Ejo project for education through sport, was completed, and the content created as part of the one about **Sport & Autism**, devoted to promoting social inclusion for children with autism spectrum disorders (ASD) through sporting games, was tested and analysed. These contents are now ready to be deployed among the professionals and teachers who work everyday with special needs kids.

Playlab also kept up its efforts to promote the inclusion of exiled people, with the launch of **Together Through Sport**, aimed at helping professionals to include Ukrainian refugee children through sport. It continued its advocacy actions by participating in several work groups, in particular alongside the Sport for Refugees Coalition for the Sport Pledge presented at the UNHCR World Refugee Forum, by co-organising a one-day discussion on the inclusion of refugees at the CNOSF, and by raising awareness among members of the Council of Europe.

Lastly, 2023 saw an acceleration in the development of **basic skills (reading, writing & arithmetic) learning** contents, the creation of new sports games on mathematics in partnership with the nonprofit Plaisir Maths, and the launch of the reading and writing learning programme.

This year the Ejo action research project led by doctoral student Eléa Chiron was completed. its purpose was to analyse the socio-educational impact of PLAY International's education through sport programme in Kosovo, Senegal, Burundi and Liberia, which involved more than 50.000 children.

Action research is a collaborative method involving field workers and researchers, that can analyse an entire project, from initial context to impact.

PLAY International, in partnership with the VIPS2 laboratory of Rennes 2 the University, carried out this action research to study the impact of the programme on children's socialisation and local teaching practices and its structural effects on various levels. Nearly 70 people were interviewed.

This project proved the effectiveness of PLAY's cocreated games. It showed that the socio-educational sessions contributed to increased awareness and better understanding among children of the importance of schooling, team spirit, how to relate to others and accept differences, etc.



Since the war broke out in Ukraine, many families have fled to neighbouring countries, including Poland and Romania.

The V4Sport Foundation, the Sport for All Suceava organisation (AJSPT) and PLAY International have joined forces to promote the integration of such refugees.

The Together Through Sport project was born, aimed at helping education as well as sport coaches to integrate refugee children through sport.

Its goal is to make sporting games a vector of integration, and by strengthening the skills of teachers and coaches, give all children, both local and exiled, the opportunity to play, build relationships and have fun moving their body.

At the end of 2023, the Playlab teams travelled to Romania to carry out a field study and observe the social integration challenges faced by Ukrainian refugees.

Our teams were able to offer several pre-selected sports games, adapting them to best meet local needs by taking in reality on the ground and discussing with our partners.






« I really enjoyed doing activity sessions with autistic children. I liked the circuits, doing return trips in sidesteps, walking in reverse, walking forwards, hopping along. To help the autistic children understand, we'd show them, and we'd also use the gestures shown by the adult, like sign language. That's how we communicated with them, and now I know lots of gestures for autistic children. I created a lot of bonds, and I feel sad leaving. I've grown very fond of them, and they've become like friends. I'd love to be able to continue playing games and sports with them. I'd also like to meet other autistic children to see how different they are, because they're not all the same. »

Sport & Refugees Day



To mark **Europe Day** on Tuesday 9 May, over 200 people gathered at the CNOSF and the Charléty Stadium to attend a Sport and Refugees Day. The event was organised by the Think tank Sport et Citoyenneté (Sport & Citizenship), the student organisation ANESTAPS and PLAY. More than 90 young people aged between 16 and 30 took part in a serious game teaching them how to better welcome foreign people and the role that civil society, sport, culture and education stakeholders can play in facilitating the inclusion of refugees. At the same time, a solidarity football tournament was kicked off by international footballer **Gaetane**

Thiney. Eight teams of 10 players, made up of refugees, asylum seekers, members of parliament and employees of nonprofits and companies, competed against each other. The cup was presented to the winning team by Andreï Chevtchenko, a Ballon d'Or winner and Ukrainian international player extremely committed to the inclusion of Ukrainian refugees, and by Laurence Boone, the French Secretary of State for Europe. The two VIPs also held a press conference about the situation of refugees, especially from Ukraine.

Inclusion Sports, a legacy of JOP 2024

On Friday 9 June, the Jules Ladoumègue Stadum in Paris hosted a sports day aimed at **promoting the inclusion of displaced youth** from the Île-de-France region. More than 150 people took part in a series of introductory sports sessions, a workshop and a round-table debate. The attending 156 youths, mainly from Terrains d'Avenir's partner welcome centres, practised several inclusive sporting activities. The consortium demonstrated how it

turned sports into a genuine means of inclusion and personal development for displaced people. PLAY led its sports and cooperative games, which help the development of psychosocial skills (communication, cooperation, critical thinking and the expression of needs) among displaced youths.

The day was also attended by a delegation from the International Olympic Committee (IOC), including its President **Thomas Bach**, Mayor of Paris **Anne Hidalgo**, and representatives of Paris 2024, including its President **Tony Estanguet**.





The Vertigo Race 🕑



2023 was the 10th anniversary of the Vertigo race! To celebrate this, the 977-step, 42-storey race returned to the CB21 Tower on 16 May. In total, over €90,000 was raised for PLAY by more than 500 participants, including around a hundred individual runners and 110 corporate

- 3. Delphine and Gwenaelle, two long-standing friends, chose to support PLAY through their participation in Destination Laponie by Défi d'Elles, the first mixed-sex polar raid. They raised 920€.
 - 4. 6 employees raised €1,529 when they took part in the Paris Marathon.
- 5. Jean, a young first-year student, took on two challenges in one week: the Monte-Cristo challenge in Marseille (6km swim in the open sea) and the Paris Adidas 10km race.

When and how did you meet PLAY International? And why did you choose to support it?

I met PLAY International after the end of my career in 2014. I was first introduced to the programme and then invited to my first PLAY Gala in 2014. I chose to get involved as an athlete, simply because education through sport and PLAY's programmes resonated with me. I wanted to be part of it and join the adventure.

What project(s) have you been involved in? Can you tell us about what you did?

I've been to Kosovo and Haiti. I also went to Mayotte, and then I simply stayed in mainland France, visiting schools in Paris. As part of this programme, I supported teachers in setting up Playdagogy. I also participated myself, setting up several sequences, and I did the same in Lima, Peru.

It's just a great opportunity to go out into the field, participate, get involved, see how things are done, experience them, and come home with a living memory of special moments, which gives you a better understanding of the issues, of PLAY'S methods and most importantly of how they impact children's lives and growth.

How is sport a genuine tool for education and inclusion?

Sport goes beyond a mere practice; it's about playing and pleasure. It's a powerful tool because it puts you in situations, in direct relationships

with others, and when these interactions are supported, they really help to develop inclusion or education because you can build upon what occurs. Most importantly, in sport, everyone belongs in some way. As a tall slender girl who didn't really know what to do with her long arms and legs and was also very shy, I found in basketball a place where I belonged. On the basketball court, my size mattered, I mattered. I learned to understand my body and that helped me grow. You also find belonging when making friends, because you feel good, because you're welcomed, and because you find a game and a place where you enjoy playing.

You're also a regular at PLAY events (Gala, Vertigo...)?

What I find interesting is that these events are genuine moments of cohesion, whether the Gala or when we meet up with our corporate partners. I think it's important to demonstrate, to explain, and simply to speak for, stand for and promote PLAY's programmes. These friendly fund-raising moments are essential to our ability to function and move forward and being present matters. The Galas are also fun and unique, held in feel-good locations and atmospheres. I enjoy them very much.

The Vertigo race is interesting because it brings people together. You see teams full of enthusiasm, full of energy, who are going to be treated to an exceptional view. That's what makes Vertigo special; you get to witness genuine togetherness. We meet teams who want to give, who want to give their best, who want to accomplish something physical, for there are records to be broken, and who also want to give of themselves for the children and the programmes that PLAY supports. The little village at the bottom of the tower completes the experience, allowing us to showcase, share, and have a great time.

How important is your role as an ambassador to you?

Being an ambassador for PLAY is important because it shows the values I stand for. That's what this role is about, I think; to share my beliefs and promote the work accomplished by PLAY's teams. For me it's essential and the positive impact of sport always needs to be put forward.

At the Paris 2024 Organising Committee, before being Activation - Mass Event Manager, you were Education Manager. Can you tell us about that position?

I arrived at Paris 2024 in 2018 and, in line with the bid committee, we were immediately very keen to set up the education programme for the Games. Therefore, I oversaw the building and developing of it. It's been an extraordinary adventure that must be told, because one of the challenges of Paris 2024 is to successfully bring everyone together to build strong, coherent projects to complement the Games. The Generation 2024 education programme was designed to use the momentum of the Games to use sport as a means of inclusion, integration and education. We brought together the French Ministry of Sports, the French National Olympic and Sports Committee (CNOSF), the French Paralympic and Sports Committee (CPSF), school and university sports organisations and federations. This collaboration enabled the implementation of the 30 minutes of daily physical activity when Covid broke out and we witnessed how detrimental the lack of sporting activity among young people was and how important daily practise was. The decision of the French Ministry of Education to introduce these 30 minutes of daily physical activity for schoolchildren, initially on an experimental basis and then on a permanent basis, had a huge impact. We also built the Olympic and Paralympic Week, an event that began as a small bid in 2017, and which was immediately relayed by teachers who seized the opportunity offered by the Games to meet athletes, to introduce different sports to their pupils, to talk about the Games, sport and their subjects in a different way. This has grown every year, and this year more than 2 million young people took part in the Week. It's just amazing how we managed to get all these primary, secondary and university students and their teachers across France involved in the Olympic adventure. And that's what's important, whether in mainland France or the French overseas territories, everyone is part of this adventure. The Games education programme is very close to my heart, because it embodies the social impact of the Games. More than 85% of the projects developed during the Olympic and Paralympic Week dealt with the theme of disability, and I think that's great, because sport is a way to tackle that theme and to slowly raise awareness in everyone, not just the youngest. It's our small contribution.

Can you explain the collaboration between PLAY and Paris 2024?

Right from the start of the bid, Paris 2024 worked in collaboration with PLAY International, especially around Playdagogy. The point was to show the impact of education through sport and how the Games could serve these projects. Paris 2024 then continued to develop these education through sport programmes, so I hope we succeeded.



PLAY International contributed to the Paris bid in the «Impact & Legacy» section. The aim was to use the event to lastingly boost physical and sporting activities in France and to promote education, social harmony and inclusion.



TEACHING THROUGH MOVEMENT

Paris 2024 co-constructed the Generation 2024 programme based on PLAY's active and participatory education method: Teaching through Movement.

Olympic and Paralympic values: teachers, educators and youth workers have been trained in fun and dynamic teaching tools.

Rugby and social harmony (with the Marseille Rugby Club): raising awareness in Marseille's neighbourhoods and schools about gender equality and the inclusion of girls.

SAJE* 20: sporting games and teaching tools designed by young people (aged 11-12) to deal with emotions: identifying, understanding, expressing and managing them.



Two PLAY projects have been selected by the Paris 2024 Endowment Fund. This fund supports projects that promote social innovation through sport (health and wellbeing, education and citizenship, inclusion, solidarity and equality, environment) led by people and structures that strengthen the daily practice of sport in society and develop access
